2008 Pacific Plan Annual Progress Report

This report has been prepared as part of the reporting cycle assessing the implementation of the Pacific Plan. It presents an update of the information provided in the 2008 Six Month Progress Report. Noting member endorsement, it has retained the format of the aforementioned report while adding, where possible, additional details provided by members, the region's technical agencies and development partners.

Every effort has been made to ensure all contributions are adequately reflected in Annex A and Annex B. Both provide substantial details on progress made in implementing the Forum Leaders *2007 Vava 'u Decisions* which have been critical in guiding Pacific Plan implementation over 2008.

However, for the sake of clarity and to avoid unnecessary repetition, the information collected has been synthesised to provide members with an overview of progress made drawing attention to key achievements and major concerns.

This report has been prepared by the Pacific Islands Forum Secretariat 's Pacific Plan Office.

Background

- 1. Over 2008 there has been ongoing progress in implementing the Pacific Plan across all four of its pillars, and in particular, in response to the Forum Leaders ' 2007 Vava' u Decisions. This progress has varied with some initiatives having advanced further than others.
- 2. The momentum provided through the 2007 prioritisation process has greatly focused the implementation of Pacific Plan initiatives by presenting clear direction and targets for members, regional agencies and development partners. Perhaps more importantly, it has also continued to ensure that the Pacific Plan is a 'living' document and the entry point for discussions on greater regional cooperation and integration through a range of processes both at the regional and international levels.
- 3. The priorities endorsed in the Forum Leaders ' 2007 Vava 'u Decisions encapsulate both continuing and emerging areas in the Pacific that require attention should the region be in a position to fully exploit its human and resource potential. These decisions cover all areas of the Pacific Plan, with the exception of culture and sport (updates provided in Annex B) grouping them along sector lines to accommodate the cross-cutting nature of the Pacific Plan 's initiatives and the challenges the region faces.
- 4. This direction continues to guide implementation and establishes a relationship to existing official and ministerial processes. In doing so, it ensures that work in key sectors such as fisheries, energy, trade and economics, is captured within broader ministerial frameworks. This has supported greater transparency and seen Forum Leaders more readily adopt a whole-of-government approach in responding to the region 's problems.
- 5. Presented annually to the Pacific Plan Action Committee (PPAC), before onward transmission to Forum Leaders, the identification of these priorities and their consideration by members represents the only regional process involving all Forum Island Countries and all Council of Regional Organsiations of the Pacific (CROP). The involvement of the latter is particularly important. The region 's technical agencies maintain a unique position. They are an extension of national capacity and provide the highest level of regular technical advice available to Pacific Islands Country and Territory governments. They represent an advisory body able to cover a broad range of areas of interest to Pacific Island peoples. Their participation in the PPAC process allows for greater programme harmonisation and offers member countries the opportunity to make informed decisions that are more strategic in nature and take into account the cross-cutting dimensions of many of the longer-term issues, challenges and risks the region faces.



Overview of progress to date on implementing the 'Key' 2007 Vava'u Priorities

- 6. The first of these key priorities is **fisheries**. Despite the considerable work undertaken to date, advice from the Forum Fisheries Committee, convened in Palau in May 2008, confirms urgent and continued efforts are required to support both tuna and coastal fisheries to secure current and future economic benefit and food security for Pacific Island people.
- 7. Work over the reporting period, led by agencies such as the FFA and SPC and strongly supported by Australia and New Zealand, has continued to uphold and strengthen existing regional arrangements, agreements and conservation measures that protect this essential resource.
- 8. A notable achievement to date includes progress by Members on implementing the *2007 Vava* ' *u Declaration on Fisheries* with, for example, entry by the Parties to the Nauru Agreement (PNA) into a Third Implementing Arrangement, which represents a bold step towards more effective management and conservation efforts. These developments send a strong message about Member commitment to addressing over-fishing in the Pacific, particularly in relation to tuna stocks.







9. Challenges however remain, the most critical involving the intense global interest in the region's fish stocks from distant water fishing nations and the continuing proliferation of illegal, unregulated and unreported operations across the Pacific. Of particular concern is the confirmation by SPC that conservation and management measures introduced by the Western and Central Pacific Fisheries Commission to date, are unlikely to adequately protect current tuna stocks from over exploitation. Both bigeye and yellowfin tuna in particular, are being fished at unsustainable levels exceeding minimum standards for limit reference points as agreed under *the United Nations Fish Stocks Agreement*.



10. The second of these key priorities is **energy**. The Vava 'u decisions recognised the need for continued high level support to address the region 's energy requirements and more specifically efforts to secure equitable access to reliable and affordable energy for all Forum Members. The 2007 Pacific Energy Ministers ' Meeting provided a significant boost towards achieving this objective. Work has continued over the reporting seeing SOPAC, the PPA and SPREP support member efforts to, in particular, strengthen national energy policy, improve utilities management and develop renewable energy options. Energy Ministers (and officials) will reconvene in April 2009.

Hosted by Tonga and supported by SOPAC, preparations are well underway. Further discussion with members may however be required on additional funding and resources for the meeting.

11. Of all of the key priorities identified in the 2007 Vava 'u Decisions, the consequences of not securing an affordable and reliable energy supply are most dire. Heavy reliance on fossil fuels continues to stunt Pacific economies. Urgent efforts are needed to address supply-side and demand-side efficiencies. As the price of fossil fuels sore, so to does the pressure on many member governments to meet short-falls through subsidies. Should this pressure continue, it may affect the future viability of some of the region 's nations. The costs of meeting this challenge however will be very significant.



12. The third key priority of **increased trade and economic integration** is central to the Pacific Plan. The integration of the region 's economies presents significant opportunities to raise living standards for all Forum Members. The continuing focus on trade and economic integration has been evident with both economic and trade ministers respectively continuing to work on ways to achieve success in these areas. In particular, efforts continue to focus on trade in services and labour mobility more generally, the latter seeing the region 's Education Ministers' turn their attention to addressing the portability of qualifications across the Pacific. Challenges however remain. Among them, the slow pace at which regional trade agreements are being implemented, the continued need to develop private sector participation in the formal economy and much needed regulatory reform. A continued focus on trade and economic integration is required to underwrite the desire to strengthen the region's economic growth and with it the improved livelihoods of the region's people.



- 13. In recognising **climate change** as a key priority for the region, Forum Leaders have acknowledged its growing threat to national development and security affecting the social and economic interests of all Forum Member countries. The region continues to intensify the implementation of adaptation and mitigation measures to better respond to the threats posed by climate change. Supported by SPREP, SOPAC and SPC, work over the reporting period continued to focus on both policy and implementation with a strong emphasis on mainstreaming climate change into national development planning and a focus on areas such as disaster risk reduction and management, renewable energy, and water conservation management.
- 14. The fifth and final of these key priorities is **transport**. The provision of reliable and effective air and maritime services will reduce trade costs and decrease the barriers that distance places on the Pacific. Eliminating unnecessary regulation allows for the freer movement of goods and services improving access to opportunity. Considerable work has been undertaken over the reporting period to support the strengthening of transport services in the region. Among the highlights has been the ratification of PIASA and PASO 's commencement of full operations. Transport 's significance as a facilitator of economic growth continues to be hampered by gaps in services and supporting infrastructure, particularly in the regions' Smaller Islands States. Noting its significance, a continued focus through regional and sub-regional approaches to improve shipping and aviation services, aviation liberalisation, safety and security as well as the physical infrastructure that supports these sectors remains an essential need for Pacific Island Countries. Progress in this area will also assist with tourism, a key economic driver for the region.
- 15. Additional details of the progress made in implementing the 2007 Key Vava 'u priorities are presented in Annex A of this report.





Overview of progress to date on implementing the 'Other' 2007 Vava'u Priorities

- 16. Pursuant to the key priorities identified in the 2007 Forum Leaders' Communiqué, Forum Leaders endorsed a number of additional priorities which too reflect the recognition of continuing and emerging areas of need in region. Spanning 13 sectors, they focus on a broad range of areas across all four pillars of the Pacific Plan.
- 17. Under pillar one and in addition to the directions provided on fisheries, trade and economic integration, and transport, Leaders have directed that work is expedited in support of information and communications technology, bulk procurement, tourism, as well as private sector development.



- 18. In summary, each of the areas has seen varied progress. For instance, as with 2006 and 2007, the implementation of activities to strengthen the region 's **information and communications technology** capabilities continues to move forward. Led by SPC and supported by the Forum Secretariat, this work has improved member telephone and internet connectivity, strengthened regulatory capacity, improved e-government, expanded connectivity through the *Rural Internet Connectivity Scheme* and improved access through the One Lap Top Per Child initiative (photographed above), with recent results from pilots in the Solomon Islands very positive.
- 19. In support of **tourism**, organisations such as south-pacific.travel in collaboration with the private sector and member governments continue to support the creation of a tourism infrastructure helping the region compete globally. Over the reporting period work has continued to develop the region 's 'b rand name' and to assist members break into new markets.
- 20. Conversely, work in the area of **bulk procurement** has not progressed as quickly as hoped with human and financial resourcing stretched. To date, a draft framework agreement has been pre-



sented to members for comment. This agreement proposes a model for how members may move forward in regionally procuring petroleum. Formal discussions among members on the options presented within this draft framework agreement are pending at the time of writing, but will commence with the July 21-22 PPAC meeting and will continue in Auckland in early October 2009 where technical and legal experts drawn from Member countries, regional bodies and multi-lateral agencies will work towards possibly finalising the aforementioned draft agreement.

- 21. Under pillar two, and in addition to Leaders' direction provided on energy and climate change, Forum Leaders have called for the additional prioritisation of work in support of strengthening national sustainable development strategies, innovative conservation financing mechanisms, agriculture and forestry, waste management, health and education.
- 22. The implementation of this set of directions has on the whole, progressed well with **waste** management and health worthy of particular mention.
- 23. In the case of the former and supported by regional technical agencies such as SPREP, significant progress has been made in addressing the issue of waste, particularly in the areas of solid, hazardous and maritime waste seeing a number of countries in the region develop and commence implementing broad-based management strategies.
- 24. Similar progress has been made in support of Health. Noting the Leaders' commitment to implement the region's Ministers of Health *2007 Vanuatu Commitment*, a revised draft of the Pacific Regional Strategy on HIV, incorporating action to combat sexually transmitted infections, and a new comprehensive joint Pacific framework for the prevention and control of non-communicable diseases have been prepared by SPC in partnership with WHO and strongly supported by Australia. Noting that non-communicable diseases are now the largest cause of adult death in the Pacific, the non-communicable disease framework is particularly significant. With five key objectives, it is hoped that this framework will strengthen the development of comprehensive national plans across the region.
- 25. Under pillar three, Leaders have directed that work supporting improved **governance** focus on integrity and accountability institutions, leadership and statistics. Again, progress has been made in these areas. For instance, and with the support of the Forum Secretariat, AusAID, the Asian Development Bank, and the Pacific Association of Supreme Audit Institutions, a design of a sub-regional audit modality has been completed and is soon to be implemented in Kiribati, Tuvalu and Nauru. In addition, the *Pacific Leadership Programme* has commenced over the reporting period while efforts are ongoing to support greater statistics capabilities in the region utilising National



Statistics 'Offices with the support of Australia, the Asian Development Bank and regional agencies such as the Forum Secretariat and SPC.

- 26. Finally under pillar four, and further to Forum Leaders 'direction, the development of a regional human security framework for conflict prevention, supported by the recent 2008 Forum Regional Security Committee, is progressing by analysing case studies on human security in Vanuatu, Samoa, Kiribati and the Federated States of Micronesia. Once finalised, it will be implemented within existing mechanisms harmonizing with current initiatives where possible. Work also continues in strengthening the exchange of information in support of fisheries law enforcement.
- 27. Additional details of the progress made in implementing other 2007 Vava 'u priorities are presented in Annex B of this report.

Proposed Pacific Plan priorities for 2009

- 28. Following the Pre-Forum Session of the Pacific Plan Action Committee in Suva, Fiji, 21-22 July 2008, and in support of the continuing implementation of the Pacific Plan, the Committee prepared for Leaders 'consideration and endorsement a list of recommendations highlighting priority areas for implementation under the Pacific Plan for 2009.
- 29. Endorsed by Forum Leaders at their 2008 meeting in Niue, Ten sectors were identified as those most important in ensuring Pacific Island people are able to enjoy sustainable social and economic prosperity in a secure and well governed region. These recommendations encapsulate both continuing and emerging areas requiring attention to support greater regional cooperation and integration while drawing on the Pacific Plan 's existing initiatives. In summary, Forum Leaders directed that priority continue to be accorded to: fisheries; energy; trade and economic integration; climate change; and transport; in addition to information and communication technology; health; education; and good governance. Forum Leaders further directed that land be considered by Forum Leaders as an emerging region-wide priority at the national level, noting its potential as a source for conflict.
- 30. In addition, the Forum Leaders highlighted the importance of addressing the ongoing challenges to **food and energy security** for all members. While acknowledging that the soaring price of food and oil is a global phenomenon, Forum Leaders offered a strong statement confirming their commitment to mitigate its already negative impact on all members.
