Technical Meeting



The PACC Technical Meeting was carried out on the 5-8th October 09 in collaboration with the Pacific Sustainable Development Centre (PACE SD) of the University of the South Pacific. It was a great workshop with a lot of enthusiasm shown by participants to understand the processes/approaches to the two main components of the project (Mainstreaming and Pilot Demonstration). It was a collaborative effort with all partners and CROP agencies contributing to different components of the workshop.

Socioeconomics was a crucial part of this training as we all know, climate change impacts are significantly altering and damaging the limited resource bases of our coastal and island communities and affecting their demographic, social, cultural, and economic structures.

Key issues and messages delivered

PACC is a climate change project

This point seems clear to everyone but the haziness dawns when implementation starts. In pure development projects, often climate change information is not necessarily taken into consideration in the design of projects. During the Technical workshop, a process was outlined to participants on how climate change information could be incorporated into the design of pilot adaptation interventions.

The participants that were present were also encouraged to work closely with their Meteorology departments and other projects e.g. Second National Communication, SCOPIC project; models such as SIMCLIM, Climate Change Explorer etc. to determine climate change projections.

Technical Assistance

The last day of the workshop focused on capacity support for the Coordinators. In the morning, pocket meetings were carried out with technical advisers from SOPAC, SPC, USP, UNDP and SPREP. These officers are keen to provide technical support to Coordinators and the PACC Country Teams if and when the need arises at the national/community level. Countries also mentioned in those discussions that they do have national and international consultants that they are able to engage if needed.

On the afternoon, Ms Moneeba Hanif and Ms Emma Mario walked the participants step by step on the fundamentals of the FACE Form. It was a very informative session and conducted in a very participatory process that allowed a very good exchange.

Even though Participants had to be evacuated on a Tsunami alert, they returned to the workshop venue three hours later to continue with the session. It was a crucial piece of support and a timely one that PACC Coordinators needed. Sincere thanks to UNDP Fiji for their support.
